Literacy of Northern New York 's main headquarters is located in the Key Bank building, 200 Washington Street, Suite 303, Watertown, New York, 13601. Our Lewis County office is located at 7640 State Street, Lowville, NY 13367. Our St. Lawrence County office is located on the 3rd floor of the Potsdam Library, 2 Park Street, Potsdam, NY, 13676. We stand ready to work closely with human service agencies to address any literacy needs their clients may have. We are a United Way partner agency and an accredited member of ProLiteracy, a national adult literacy organization.

What We Do

We teach adults in Jefferson, Lewis and St. Lawrence Counties how to improve reading, writing skills and math skills. We also assist adults who are learning English as a second language. Other programs include computer literacy and helping people study for the U.S. citizenship test.

Literacy of Northern NY accepts donations of gently used children's books, which we give away to impoverished families who can't afford to buy them.

How We Do It

We train volunteers to use professionally developed methods of teaching basic reading and English to speakers of other languages.

The one-to-one tutoring provided by us is individualized and confidential.

Tutoring is done at a time and place convenient to both the tutor and the learner. We use libraries, churches, municipal buildings, and other public places for the tutoring sessions.

Some Clues in Recognizing Adults With Low Reading Skills

Adults who can't read well tend to hide this fact from others. When asked to read something, they may say, "I can't read this now. I have a headache," or "I forgot my glasses." When given a form to fill out, they ask if they can bring it back tomorrow. This gives them time to find a more literate person to

fill it out for them.
